Picture books: exquisitely illustrated tales full of humour and poetry that captivate adults and children alike. "Picture books: illustrated & staged", an exhibition curated by picture book expert Hans ten Doornkaat, presents a rich selection of contemporary works from Switzerland and abroad, putting the spotlight on a medium that oscillates between storytelling, illustration and visual design. It also provides a glimpse into the studios of several Swiss illustrators, some of whom can be observed at work during live events. The exhibition is accompanied by a varied programme of events.

Simple tales full of wit and poetry are brought to life as we eagerly turn the pages of picture books, whose illustrations transport us to other worlds. As vehicles for meaning, picture books speak to the reader (or storyteller) in a very direct way. Their illustrations allow us to enjoy the delight of discovery as well as the comfort of familiarity. At the same time, there is always something new to be found in picture books. The longer we look at them, the more multilayered and complex their content becomes – yet they still form a coherent whole. How do picture books achieve this?

The exhibition explores the types of visual narrative found in contemporary picture books, with particular attention to their singular immediacy. It brings stories vividly to life for children and adults alike, and investigates the creative process of picture book production. From jaunty colours to minimalist grey tones, from polished digital images to rough sketches, and from unusual pop-up formats to pages featuring cutouts, the design possibilities seem endless. The show also visits the studios of Swiss illustrators and takes a look over their shoulders at live events.

Narrative techniques ...

What does where a book folds have to do with the story? What use is made of the space available for images? What associations are evoked by colours and shapes as the pages are turned? Picture books are more than just illustrated texts: a book's pictures and physical qualities generate new levels of meaning, forming a language in themselves. Stories – whether they are humorous, critical of society or fantastical (or all three) – may even be told without any words at all, using several image levels. Only a picture book can do this! The exhibition explores these multiple possibilities.

... and illustrations

Illustrations bring stories to life on the pages of a book. From jaunty colours to minimalist grey tones, from polished digital images to rough sketches, and from unusual pop-up formats to pages with holes punched through, illustrators apparently have endless design options from which to choose.

Materiality ...

Combining words with pictures can have a remarkable impact in many different media, but with a picture book the focus is on the physical nature of the book itself. Fold-out pages evade the usual book format, paper engineering creates complex pop-up effects, and a hole punched through the entire book can have a different effect on each succeeding page.

... and the making of picture books

What steps do illustrators follow in order to produce a finished picture book? The exhibition considers picture books in the context of the design process and offers a glimpse into the studios of Swiss illustrators.

Meta picture books ...

Nowadays, picture books even use their own fictionality as a theme. Inventing and developing the story becomes part of the action itself, as a type of metaconstruction. Characters enter into discussion with the author or contemplate the (im)possibility of rewriting their own stories. Similarly, the role of the observer may come under the spotlight – such as when a book has to be held upside down to prevent the characters falling out. This playful exploration of the status quo brings expectations to consciousness, only to baffle them. It is no coincidence that meta picture books succeed in testing the physical and aesthetic boundaries of the medium in so many ways.

... and reading aloud

Storytelling as a performance is also an integral aspect of the picture book. Like performative or authorial readings, which make use of the voice and of reading techniques to explore the narrative, reading (aloud) together is not only a social and unifying experience but also a meaningful cultural act.
